# A Hindu wedding celebration, a seven day event



My husband and I were honoured to celebrate and take part in our friend's daughter (Brenna) wedding in St. John's Newfoundland this past August. The groom's (Sujay) family hosted six different proceedings spanning seven days. The first event was the **GARBA** dance at the Hindu Temple – no person was allowed to wear shoes to the upper level of the Temple. The dance involved the use of 2 batons (wooden sticks) and two lines of dancers facing each other. After 5 beats with the batons each person moved left one spot and danced with a new partner. It was great fun mastering the use of the batons and not banging your own, or partners', fingers. Immediately following the dance, the guests went to the lower level and had a delicious buffet dinner of traditional Indian, spicy, foods. The yogurt and cold water were most welcome as cooling refreshments.

Then: the **MEHNDI**. This is a special Hindu ritual – held outdoors at the groom's family home. The groom's mother and aunts sang songs in Punjabi to welcome Brenna to the family. During the party, the women were invited to have henna symbols painted onto a hand for the wedding day. The bride had intricate designs on the palms and upper sides of her hands and fingers as well as the tops of her feet, from toes to heels and around the lower part of her feet. Food was prepared by Sujay's family relatives and friends. Preparations were begun three weeks before as family arrived from India, Australia, England and western Canada.



The third event was the conventional stag and stagett for Sujay and Brenna. On to the fourth proceeding. This was the **VIDHI**, a traditional activity for the bride and groom, organized by the bride's mother at her home and by the groom's father at the groom's home. The **PANDIT**

(priest) prays in the Sanskrit language to the **LORD GENESH** (the Hindu God) to remove all obstacles and seek his divine blessing for the bride and groom. A part of this ceremony is the **PITHI** (rubbing a paste made of chickpea flour, tumeric, rose water and other various ingredients onto the bride's skin. A similar action is done for the groom. Following the Pithi, refreshments were served and the priest took the bride and groom's family to a separate room to discuss details of what to expect during the wedding ceremony the next day.



**The Big Day.** The guests dance in the parking lot at the Temple awaiting Sujay's arrival. The bride's mother greets Sujay by applying **TILAK** on to his forehead. He is presented

with a **SAMPOOT** (clay pot) which he breaks with his foot as a declaration to Brenna's family that he is not seeking material comfort, but has come only for Brenna. The wedding was performed completely in Sanskrit (with explanations provided in English for the guests). The focal setting was the **MANDAP** (wedding canopy). The groom arrived under the canopy first, then four of the bride's male relatives held a blanket to keep Sujay from seeing Brenna until she was seated under the canopy. The ceremony ended with Sujay placing **SINDOOR** (holy red powder) onto Brenna's head and placed a necklace of gold and jewels around her neck. Both my husband and I as "aunt and uncle" of the bride were called under the canopy a couple of times to assist with parts of the rituals. After, a buffet with home cooked Indian fare and cold drinks was served at the temple. Before the wedding car departs, the bride's family mockingly tries to stop the groom from taking her away.

The next day, a more conventional reception (with catered Indian food) and was held at a local Golf Club. Festivities with a DJ playing traditional Indian and contemporary music, dancing and libations continued until late evening.

Visitors to Simcoedining.com will find listings for over 300 restaurants, bars and cafes, with links to reviews, more of which are being posted weekly.

The long term goal for Simcoedining.com is to help promote Barrie as a vibrant place to live or visit. ## **Progress Report for the Barrie Solterra Co-housing project.**

*In June 2012, Solterra Co-housing Ltd was awarded \$10,000 dollars from CMHC SEED funding for the development of an affordable housing project in the Barrie area. The eligible activities for the funding criteria must be carried out within a twelve month period.*

*Coolearth architecture inc. was contracted to complete a housing market study to determine the need and demand for the Barrie area in addition, they will develop the business plan for the project and explore funding sources, evaluate the procurement options and develop the preliminary feasibility analysis for the project.*

*Once the final design plans for the building have been finalized the renderings will be printed and mounted for display purposes.*

*Two options will be evaluated and considered for development.*

***Option A** will be the development of a 5 suite shared home from the purchase of vacant land, construction of the shared home to selling individual suites including an analysis of the monthly operations for the home.*

***Option B** will be the purchase of an existing home in the Barrie area that will be suitable for 5 shared suites. Legal fees, renovation costs and monthly operations will also be considered.*

*Each option will be reviewed for feasibility. The final needs analysis and the business plan will then be submitted to CMHC for further project funding of \$100,000.00 to build the shared housing project in the Barrie area. We anticipate this should be completed mid September 2012.*

*With receipt of CMHC funding, we likely will find the additional funding from an investor to purchase land and build the home or two, pre-sales would allow us the same opportunity to proceed.*

# LIVING ON BORROWED TIME.

**O**n the morning of 8th October 1952 one of the most serious accidents in United Kingdom railway history occurred at Harrow & Wealdstone station just north of London, on the main line to the north. A southbound express ran into the rear of a local train standing in the station, and another express, northbound from Euston, ran into the wreckage. 112 people were killed, and hundreds more were injured.

I was in the Royal Air Force and had just finished a week's leave from boot camp. And now returning to a new base to receive trade training as a paramedic. At eighteen years old, I was pretty green, but old enough (so I thought), to go to the train station on my own, however my mother had her own ideas and insisted on accompanying me to Euston station.

In those days, people who were seeing travelers off, could purchase a "platform ticket" which allowed them to go through the ticket gates onto the platform, which is what my mother did.

As you can imagine this did not sit well with me, as the train was full of other airmen returning to their bases, and all I could think of was "it's time for her to go".



Walking along the platform, we came to a brand new carriage. I said jokingly "Look Mum, they put on a brand new carriage just for me, I'll get on here, and then you can go". "No, lets just walk a bit closer to the front of the train" she said. For her to stay, was not what I wanted, but I insisted and finally she agreed, we kissed and she left to return home. Relieved, I got settled and waited for the train to leave at its designated time of 8.00 o'clock. The time came and went, then at thirteen minutes past the hour we finally left the station heading to the north of England.

Within minutes, the train had reached a speed of about 90 mph, trying to make up for the lost time. A few minutes later there was the most awful sound like a machine gun, the carriage tilted and then I lost consciousness.

I have no idea how long I was out, but woke up looking at a fireman chopping a hole in the roof of my new carriage (see the picture) A few moments later I felt myself being pulled through the hole he had created.

Sitting on the roof, with blood running down my face I witnessed a scene of complete devastation, everything ahead of my carriage had been demolished, and was now a 30 foot pile of rubble, there, standing on the top of this rubble was a priest with his arms outstretched. *I thought I had died and gone to heaven.*

My recollection of the rest of the day is very sketchy, however my journey did go on, but that's a story for another day. Needless to say, I never let my mother forget the incident, and that is how I feel "I'm living on borrowed time" *Submitted and written by Gerry Levene*
